



# Pakistan: Rising Humanitarian Crisis (As of May 20, 2009)

- Apr 26-29** • Civilians begin fleeing to escape Government of Pakistan (GOP) military offensive in Lower Dir and Buner Districts.
- May 3** • Taliban takes Mingaora, lays mines, establishes checkpoints, and imposes curfews. Swat residents begin fleeing; UNHCR and GOP build more IDP camps.
- May 7** • GOP army moves into Swat. GOP and UNHCR register IDPs for distribution of food, water, and information.
- May 10-11** • Camps start reaching capacity. Extreme heat and lack of provisions result in further IDP dislocations in Mardan and Swabi Districts.
- May 11-12** • Continued problems with aid distribution leads to IDP protests; UNHCR delivers 120 tons of non-food items.
- May 15** • Pakistan military allows 100,000 civilians to flee zones of conflict; many more remain trapped and exposed to fighting.
- May 19** • Temperatures in excess of 100°F. Critical health needs rising among IDP population, including respiratory tract infections, diarrhea, scabies and malaria.
- May 20** • UNOCHA reports nearly 1.8 million IDPs since May 2, with 88% sheltering outside of camps, with host families, in rented rooms or in spontaneous settlements.




## New IDPs\*: Vast Majority Sheltering outside Camps

## IDPs: 3 Weeks of Rapidly Growing Displacement


