


Haiti: Population Movements Outside of Port-au-Prince



On Jan 21, the Government of Haiti announced plans to relocate at least 400,000 displaced individuals from metropolitan Port-au-Prince. Efforts are underway to establish a site for the first 100,000 on the city's periphery.

HAITI

LOCATION (est. pop.)	DESCRIPTION
Jérémie (103,889)	Overburdened ferries, some using Government of Haiti (GOH)-provided fuel, are shuttling people from Port-au-Prince (PaP). The International Organization for Migration (IOM) reports that several thousand people are arriving in the town (115mi/185km from PaP) by road and boat.
Camp Perrin (36,124)	Trucks are transporting between 100 to 150 people to Camp Perrin, a small town in Sud Département. Over the last week, nearly a thousand people arrived in the town.
Les Cayes (132,406)	GOH is beginning to provide free bus service, but some are still paying inflated prices to travel to relatively untouched cities including Les Cayes (95mi/152km west of PaP). IOM reports a continuous flow of people into the city in search of shelter and support.
Saint-Marc (199,124)	Partners in Health and the Pan-American Health Organization (PAHO) both report a very large influx of people from PaP are arriving in Saint-Marc (25 miles/40km north of PaP) and moving into evacuation camps and shelters; hospitals are overwhelmed and lack water, food, and staff.
Gonaïves (263,716)	IOM reports a continuous flow of people in search of shelter and support arriving in Gonaïves (65mi/105km north of PaP); UN OCHA reports that at least 45 buses arrived in the city on Jan. 21.
Cap Haïtien (211,630)	It is estimated that several thousand people are arriving daily to Cap Haïtien (85 miles/137km north of PaP). Local civic organizations and businesses are hiring buses to bring people.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

Jimaní (11,414)	Immigration officials from the Dominican Republic (DR) continue to admit Haitians with urgent medical needs at the border post near Jimaní. IOM reports Haitians massing at border hospitals in search of medical treatment, but that the accumulation is not occurring as rapidly as initially thought. Those who have already received attention are asking for help to return home, but many Haitians have nowhere to go once their treatment is complete. PAHO reports on Jan 18, that in recent days, the 20-bed hospital in Jimaní saw 2,000 people, and conducted 200 major surgeries.
Santa Cruz de Barahona (77,698)	Haitians requiring specialized medical care beyond what can be provided in Jimaní are being transferred to Santa Cruz de Barahona.
Santo Domingo (2,987,013)	Severe medical cases and overflow from border health facilities are also being directed to Santo Domingo.
